The AIDS and Anthropology Task (AATF) of the American Force Anthropological Association (AAA) Chair, Douglas A. Feldman, appointed Michael D. Quam to serve as Co-Chair of the AATF from July November, 1988. The Co-Chairs named an ad hoc selection committee to recommend persons to be invited for AATF membership. Gilbert Herdt, William Rowe, and Melanie Sovine formed the committee which met last July in Chicago.

Criteria considered for inclusion as an AATF member were: 1) strong, demonstrated commitment to AIDS and anthropology research and/or activities, 2) publication record on AIDS-related research and/or activities, 3) previous participation in AIDS and anthropology conferences sessions, 4) knowledge potential funding sources, and and willingness availability participate in periodic AATF conferences probably without any renumeration. After careful deliberation and negotiation between Co-Chairs, 23 persons were selected. It was acknowledged that there are other persons who may also be qualified for membership, but that it was important to keep the number down to no more than 23 in order to make the Task Force efficient. If vacancies occur, they will be filled.

The AIDS and Anthropology Task Force (AATF) convened its first conference since its formation at the Society for Applied Anthropology in Tampa last April. Gil Herdt hosted the two-day conference on October 1-2, 1988, which was held at the University of Chicago. The conference co-chaired by Michael D. Quam and Douglas A. Feldman. The conference was also attended by AATF members Francis Conant, Barbara 0. de Zalduondo, Paul Farmer, Doug Goldsmith, E. Michael Gorman, Norris L. Leap, Shirley G. Lang, William Lindenbaum, Susan McCombie, Pricilla Reining, Ron Stall, Melanie Sovine, and Martha Ward, and by the AAA President, Roy A. Rappaport.

The AATF began to draft a statement of purpose emphasizing its AIDS-related on ' both anthropological research and activism. It was agreed that the Task Force would support both the initiation of AIDS-related research anthropologists and the dissemination of the findings, as well as lobbying activities for the amelioration of AIDS-related social and medical problems. The conference participants agreed to draft position statements on several areas of concern, such as AIDS and ethics. These will be reviewed at the next meeting of the AATF to be Phoenix held in in November. A resolution is also being prepared to oppose AIDS-related discrimination to be brought before a vote at the AAA in Phoenix.

Among the ideas suggested at the conference · are proposals for research and AIDS conference onparticpant observation, and the creation of several regional subcommittees (e.g., AIDS in Africa, AIDS in Latin America, etc.) which would be composed mostly anthropologists from outside the Task (continued on page four)
